## The TBA Professional Development Clinic: New Benefits For Its Membership From TBA

Two years ago The Texas Bandmasters Association launched the first in a new series of professional development sessions outside the summer convention. The well-attended session included former TBA President Susan Scarborough's band as the demonstration group and Greg Countryman and Cindy Lansford as clinicians in a clinic focused on effective use of daily drill for middle school band. This clinic was the pilot for an effort, that the TBA Board of Directors hoped would become an opportunity to further help its membership.
