Try to maintain a healthy lifestyle

Have hobbies outside of the music world

Be flexible. Many students have multiple interests

Demand excellence with respect

Maintain teacher/student relationship

Do not let other issues interfere with the professionalism in the classroom

Be pleasant patient and caring

You should love and have a passion for what you have chosen to do

Students need to know you really care

Attend student concert prior to them coming to your school and after they leave

Part VI: Management Strategies

Be consistent and fair. There are consequences for all actions Remember to reward the behavior you want repeated Get parents involved early on

Make expectations and consequences clear *prior* to events taking place

Move quickly and keep all students engaged as much as possible Correct behaviors and move on

Incorporate a website to keep students aware of upcoming events or changes in schedules

Take a pro-active rather than re-active approach to discipline Treat students as you would want a teacher to treat your child
