HOW YOUR COLOR GUARD CAN ENHANCE YOUR MUSICAL EFFECT

 CHOREOGRAPHY Questions to ask: What counts are accented or emphasized? Listen to the music first and figure out where the strong counts are in the phrase. These counts are the most important. What is the shape of the melodic line? When you are watching your choreography, you should be able to see how the music matches it. What is the instrumentation of the phrase? If the full ensemble is playing, then match that intensity with more color. If it is a smaller section, try taking some of the color away. The visual intensity should complement the musical intensity. Where does the phrase fit in the overall structure of the piece? Plan out where you will put the big visual moments to 	 STAGING General rules: If you have more than one idea musically, stage more than one idea in the color guard. Flags with melody, another set with counter melody Weapons/Flags/Dancers, you can use different visual voices Try to avoid passing through too often It is fine to do it, but a good drill writer will never have them constantly passing through the band or during an impact moment Pass- throughs should be choreographed Choreograph and stage transitions between equipment Don't be afraid to use improvisation!
