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Facts & thoughts that may or may not get discussed today!

We hold our Chamber Recital on the Thursday before the annual TMEA Convention. A performance evaluator is encouraged to interact with the performers at the conclusion of their performance in the presence of the audience. Number ratings are not given. **Appropriate dress is required and all student performers must serve as audience members at some point during the evening!** The choir room and black box theatres are utilized, and by the end of the night it is not uncommon for our top groups to perform for packed rooms with standing room only. An outstanding woodwind and brass group is selected in each band.

Our 2nd and 3rd bands mostly utilize homogenous choirs. In the top band we have had as many as three woodwind quintets and mixed brass ensembles running concurrently. 99.9% of our ensembles are pre-assigned. On rare occasions students are allowed to form their own brass quintets, woodwind quintets, and duets. The duets do not take the place of their primary ensemble responsibilities. Each ensemble has an assigned coach. Students are increasingly researching literature on their own and asking the opinion of staff members!

The Spring 1st band saxes, The Enigma Saxophone Quartet, performed at the 2013 Midwest Clinic and was the highest-ranking wind group at the 2014 Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition, reaching the semi-finals round. They won 1st place at the 2014 Houston Underground Saxophone Competition and placed 3rd at this event in 2013. The Enigma and Veritas Saxophone Quartets are both coached by Jason Smith.
