- Plan your work and work your plan

Conducting

- You are not a drum major (anymore!)
- o The baton is your instrument
 - Bring your instrument to rehearsal!
- o Practice in the mirror or video
- Follow through

- Individual
 - o Pass offs
 - Recordings
 - Down the row #DTR
 - Objectives
 - Chair tests
 - o Interactive via method book
 - Smart music

Peer tutoring

- Office aids
- Star students
- High school to middle school
- o Student-led instrument clubs
- Rehearsal expectations (Student Engagement = Teacher Preparation)
 - Train beginners to have good listening skills so concepts transfer to performing band
 - Sense of urgency
 - Listening awareness

- Instead of letting the band sightread a piece (and then correcting them), tell them BEFORE you start the piece... "these notes are detached, the melody is in the low brass".

- Have every student play something by themselves every single day.
- Put "nice" notes you receive from students, parents, and administrators in a folder. When you are having a bad day, open the folder and read a few. It will remind you that you are appreciated and give you the necessary lift to get back to work!
