
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INTRODUCTION

How do we replicate the primary means of band instruction?

(Zoom, Google Meets, Youtube)

Rehearsal Philosophy

What do we think a rehearsal is?

- 1. Performing music in real time with one another.
 - a. This is not possible
 - b. Everything else on this page is possible!

What is a rehearsal actually?

- **1**. Accountability for practicing
- 2. Ear training
- 3. Instrumental Techniques
- 4. Ensemble Skills Training
- 5. Opportunity for team growth, social interaction
- 6. Instant Feedback for individual and group performance



Three Basic Methods

Teacher Led

Similar to regular class. Teacher Guides Rehearsal

Student Led

Students break into small groups with section leader

Pre-recorded

Like a home workout video. May work for well regular exercises.

Teacher Led

Tools and Exercises:

- 1. Screen share metronome, tuner, DAW with music recordings.
- 2. Give feedback that you would normally give (know the score and prepare rhythms)
- 3. Call and response (students evaluate themselves)
- 4. F around the Zoom


Preparation is incredibly important for a good online rehearsal. Don't wing it and send the plan early.

Student Led

Section Leader or small groups

- 1. Small groups allow section to focus on their parts independently and gives leadership responsibility.
- 2. Give you section leader a plan and time stamps.
- 3. Expect the section leader to play the part with a metronome call and response style.
- 4. Opportunity for "play offs" or recording.
- 5. Can be during a full rehearsal or completely separate.



Student Led Example Plan

10:00 - Greet everyone in your section. Each member shares their favorite tv show, book, or game they've played in the last week.

10:05 - Demonstrate Measures 123 - 154 with metronome at 84 bpm. Point out and count at least one challenging rhythm.

10:08 - Everyone counts and fingers the passage together (84 bpm)

10:10 - 5 minutes individual practice. Section leader is ready to answer questions.

10:15 - Play the section together 3 times

10:20 - Rejoin main group

Pre-recorded

Video recorded exercises-

- 1. Breaks up rehearsal
- 2. Always last the same amount of time
- 3. Can be used asynchronously

Here are the things we might teach

- 1. Music Theory
- 2. Music History (Instruments, Musicians, Local)
- 3. Science of Music
- 4. Music Current Events
- 5. Improvisation
- 6. Composition
- 7. Listening and analysis
- 8. Music Educator/Music Education
- 9. Instrumental Methods



CONCEPTS

Content Delivery

Packets, pre-recorded video, live video conferencing, books, audio

*Teacher side

Practice/ Assessment

Online/paper test, essays, videos, worksheets, online activities, projects (more on that later!)

*Student Side

Methods and tools for Assessment

- 1. Quizzes and test(Paper, Google Forms etc)
- 2. Essays
- 3. Worksheets (Online tools like MusicTheory.net)
- 4. Smart Music
- 5. Video and audio submissions (Email, Google Classroom)
- 6. Peer Group Accountability
- 7. PBL and Open Ended (I swear we'll get to it!)

Sample Lessons

- Students read and answer question about a current music news article or historical account.
- Students watch a music theory lesson, practice on musictheory.net and then apply the concept to a short compositional example.
- Students watch a lesson about a composer and have to select a work by them and write a listening report.



More Complex

- Students take on the role of a UIL judge. Using the UIL rubrics they judge online performances of marching / concert bands and justify their ratings. (Next steps, compare the ratings given and discuss in the groups). *Mike Lunney Credit*
- Students listen to a jazz solo. Teacher divides the solo into individual measures and each student transcribe one measure and record it on their instrument. Videos can be combined into a performance.



History Project

- 1. Each student interviews a former member of your band program with a preselected set of questions. Interviews are recorded.
- 2. Students write a summary of the experiences including what they learned.
 - a. Students could combine segments of different interviews to tell a story in audio or visual mediums.
 - b. Students could investigate and perform an old favorite song dedicated to an alumni.
 - c. Students can share a library of interviews with local community.

Learn to perform your favorite song.

Cross Curricular

Visually represent a song with art

Technology

Make a podcast episode about something music related

Project Based Learning (PBL)

Example lessons:

- Homemade Instruments
- Students select music and make a program (with program notes) for an imaginary concert. (include sheet music prices)
- Record video library of marching fundamentals
- Virtual concerts are PBL (just like regular concerts)
- Composition and performance assignments

Pride, community, and relevance

What is a performance?

- Student output (pride and accomplishment)
- Community exposure
- Group Project
- Community Music Education
- Institutional (school) exposure and relevance

Virtual Full Bands are HARD!!!


- Student accuracy must be high
