- District policies will vary across the state
 - Different scenarios and restrictions
 - o Different models across the state
 - Planning with your campus administration is key

Creative scheduling

- We will all have smaller class sizes. Questions to be asked and answered:
 - How large is the classroom space and how many students and teachers can safety occupy the space?
 - Do you have any flexibility on how to schedule these classes?

- While not ideal, it may enable us to focus on individuals and small groups more successfully. Can you split your classes into subgroups such as:
 - Woodwind and Brass
 - Voices
 - Choirs such as High Brass/Low Brass
 - Brings focus to more individualized instruction
 - Brings focus to smaller ensembles with unique instrumentation
 - Composers are currently focusing on unique compositions for smaller ensembles or ensembles with flexible instrumentation

- The Blended Model Live & Virtual Band
 - o Live "To-Do List" Make time to:
 - Re-engage students in music classrooms
 - Recreate the band hall environment
 - Build relationships with your freshmen
 - Create music together it's been 5 months!
 - Prepare you students for virtual instruction
 - Virtual "To-Do List" Make time to:
 - Zoom your live rehearsals & record them
 - Don't overload your students with technology
 - There will be disappointment if/when schools go to 100% virtual learning
 - Drum Majors and Section Leaders will lead the community
 - Virtual learning for Band is NOT the wave of the future
 - Lack of Synergy
 - Ensemble skills will diminish/not develop
 - Promote the success and efforts of students and teachers live and virtual
 - While putting student and teacher safety first, we must continue to promote the need and importance of ensemble performance

Curriculum Revision

 - Importance of continuing marching fundamentals

- Using marching music to teach concepts what a concept!

 - o Pep Bands
 - Stand tunes are good material
- TMEA All-State audition process
 - TMEA will proceed with the All-State process (video)
 - This will provide some normalcy, perhaps bringing more focus to this material in class
 - Length and cuts may vary from student to student

- 1st 6 Weeks Curriculum Revisions MUST
 - NOT reinvent the band wheel
 - Be interesting and enjoyable for students
 - Help students feel good about what they are doing given the limitations they will face in 2020-2021
 - Provide some "football game" vibes
 - Help to keep your program an important component of what your school offers to students long term

Remediation

- Lack of full UIL C&SR process and Spring performances will result in diminished development regardless of how much they've been practicing as individuals
- Opportunity to focus on a reset of fundamentals
- Reconnect with your returning students and become familiar with your incoming freshmen and their needs
 - Send out a student survey before you begin camp
 - Google Forms, Survey Monkey, etc.
 - Send out a parent survey before you begin camp
 - Ask for their feedback
 - We can't address every concern
 - Seeing things through the eyes of a parent will help us plan and give us ideas
 - We will be able to make more informed decisions
 - Create YouTube videos to inform parents and students
 - Stay on topic and separate facts from feelings
 - Share on social media
 - Set up meetings to connect and reconnect with students & parents
 - Listen more
 - Convey a unified message to all
 - "We will do what is best for students and teachers, always, while following our district and campus safety guidelines"
 - Reconnect with the community
 - Keep them informed
 - More information is better
 - Know what they want and what they feel
 - Assure them we are doing all we can to remain safe
 - Create ways to remain a visible part of the community
